People stopped talking and drinking coffee when they passed the monks. We were astonished at their ability to concentrate in the commotion and grating sounds of demolition.

When the days grew darker, we had a more pressing question: how come they were not cold? Still in sandals and their saffron robes, they continued their deep prayer ritual even in the dreary, wet snow. Strangers in a strange land, reaching out to God for us!

In late June, Century 21, the largest store across from the rubble was reopening. We were beyond joyous to see Mike Bloomberg, the mayor, and George Pataki, the governor, cut the ribbon to the store. I looked at the fence to see the monks, but they were gone and they never came back.

EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW WITH MIMI ROCAH

Transcribed from live interview by Elena, Clayton and Lucas Prisament

As we all know, former federal prosecutor (and our cousin) Mimi Rocah has decided to start her bid for Westchester DA (District Attorney). Running as a Democrat, Mimi Rocah is set to run against incumbent Anthony A. Scarpino Jr. Below is the transcript of our exclusive interview with Mimi Rocah.

What inspired you to run for Westchester County DA?

I was inspired to run for DA because it is a position which better serves our whole community. I have a general devotion to community service. I have been inspired by people who have never run for office before - especially women - stepping up right now in this time to help make our government - at all levels - better.

What are the responsibilities of the DA?

The role of the DA is a type of lawyer. We act like investigators and lawyers who investigate and prosecute crime. We have to figure out who committed a crime, and make sure they have a fair trial. And if they get convicted of a crime, then they might go to jail, or get a sentence or a fine. That's the main job of the District Attorney.

What differentiates you from the incumbent DA?

I will be a much more proactive DA, a much more innovative DA, and a really progressive DA. And I will bring a different perspective to it because I am a woman who has also been a prosecutor for 16 years. The incumbent DA was never a prosecutor before.

How was your campaign affected by coronavirus?

It's been very affected by it. Candidates running for office everywhere - including the presidential candidates - now have to do everything digitally. So, we have video meetings, and video campaign events, and we're doing a lot more on social media. And you have to be very mindful of the fact that people are going through a really hard time. You have to raise money as a candidate, and it's definitely harder to ask people to donate to a campaign right now when

CHAOS THEORY EXPLAINED

Chaos Theory is a mathematical theory that describes unpredictable systems. A *chaotic system* has an extreme sensitivity to *initial conditions* - meaning a small change at an early time leads to a big change at a later time.


Imagine in January 2020 that someone named Alice is unaware that she has Covid-19. She goes for a walk in busy downtown Seattle and sneezes, infecting a passerby Bob who then gets on a plane to Detroit, Michigan, eventually leading to an outbreak there. If we change the *initial condition* slightly by having Alice walk 8 more feet before sneezing: she instead infects passerby Charles who then goes on a road trip to Portland, Oregon leading to an outbreak there. In this hypothetical scenario, a minor 8-foot difference at the beginning leads to a drastically different outcome - an entirely different city has the outbreak!

We can explain phenomena like this with math! The story above would be hard to model, but we can show similar results with a simpler system: kneading bread dough (or Grandma Rozanne's famous Scotch dough).



Pretend the orange line is our dough and it stretches from -1 to 1 on the number line. When you knead dough, you

A lethal net


I wish to watch the painting of history

stretch it and then fold it over back on itself.



Combining the above operations we get:

$$w = |2x| - 1$$

Grandma can tell you that you don't knead just once, you repeat it over and over:

$$\begin{aligned}x_1 &= |2x_0| - 1 \\x_2 &= |2x_1| - 1 \\x_3 &= |2x_2| - 1\end{aligned}$$

Now let's drop a grain of rice into our dough at position 0.123 and see where it ends up. Since this is a *chaotic system* even the tiniest change to the grain's initial position drastically changes its ending position after just a few kneading steps. We can see this by dropping another grain in at position 0.124:

Grain	START	x_1	x_2	x_3	x_4	x_5	x_6	x_7	x_8	x_9

We can also look at the distance between grains A and B:

$ A-B $	0.001	0.002	0.004	0.008	0.016	0.032	0.064	0.128	0.256	0.512

Notice that the distance between the grains (known as the "error") is growing exponentially - it doubles with each step. Any system whose error eventually grows to the size of the entire domain is *chaotic*. Another way to think about this: if you add a drop of blue food coloring to the dough before kneading, eventually the entire dough ball will turn blue.

Exercise: Investigate what happens to other rice grains with different starting positions between -1 and 1 when you knead the mathematical dough. Do you notice any patterns?

so many people are having trouble just making ends meet for themselves and their families.


What would you do about coronavirus?

That's not really part of the DA's job, but there are a few things about it that are kind of relevant to the DA's office. For one, the government right now is defining what is an essential business. And some of the things that are being defined as an "essential business" are - to me - pretty questionable. In particular, gun shops, and also certain banking businesses... Banks are obviously essential, but there are all of these money fund offices that are open, which don't need to be. Obviously that doesn't seem essential in the same way, and could certainly be done from home. I know a lot of people still going to their offices for work.

Point two: Law enforcement has to enforce these new rules. So when they see people gathering in groups, or hanging out in restaurants, or having their own little get-togethers and things like that, the police and the law enforcement have to enforce the laws against that.
